Community cleanup - May 6

The annual Miller cleanup started with the MCC, but as new groups arose, they have also joined in this rite of spring. Everyone is invited to help out, and support will be coming from the **MCC, the MBA, the Miller Garden Club**, church groups and ordinary citizens. This year's cleanup is planned for **Saturday, May 6, from 7:00 to 11:00 am**, starting at the corner of Grand Blvd and Miller Avenue (former Ralph's parking lot). **Participants can start work whenever they like**, but the finish of the cleanup is set for 11:00 am, because the trash must be hauled to the land-fill before it closes at noon. Private individuals keep trash under control year-round in many areas, but there is still plenty of work to be done in the spring.

Important legislation approved

Several bills which are important to Gary residents have now been signed by Governor Holcomb:

House bill 1144 authorizes the establishment of Transportation Development Districts (TDDs) around stations on the existing South Shore Line and the proposed West Lake Extension. They will capture increases in property and income taxes to pay for bond issues used to finance the expansion and improvements.

Senate bill 128 requires the state treasurer to intercept local funds if a county or municipality that has contracted with the RDA to support the South Shore Line fails to make its required payments. **These bills assure that the South Shore extension and improvements will be built, and they were generally supported by the MCC and local residents.**

Senate bill 567 puts a state-appointed emergency manager in charge of the Gary Community schools, who will supplant the elected school board and exclusively exercise all financial and academic authority over Gary schools. **This bill eliminates local control of education**, and its key focus is **eliminating the debt**, rather than educating the children. Local leaders, for the most part, don't like it, but they have few alternative ideas.

MCC Lakeshore Committee gets beachfront organized

THE ANNUAL MEETING.

On Thursday, April 20, the Shoreline Committee held its traditional annual meeting with all the public officials who share responsibility for public safety and operations on the beach and Marquette Park - Police Chief Larry McKinley, Park Superintendent McKenya Dilworth, a Deputy Sheriff,, and Marquette Park Manager Tiffany Merrills were all present.

PUBLIC SAFETY

Officer Simon Lillie announced that there will be additional beach patrol officers this year, stationed in zones for quick response in emergencies. There will be more parking signs and enforcement will focus on drinking, especially by teenagers. **Parking lots will remain open until 9:00 pm**, to accommodate visitors who want to stroll the beach at sunset. There will be a ticket booth for the small parking lot at the Montgomery St. concession stand. **(The cost for parking will be \$5 for Gary people and \$7 for others.)** Equipment will include a new 4-wheel drive ATV and a drone.

Lake County contributes a marine unit, including jet skis to patrol on the lake, and a helicopter equipped with floodlight.

From the Gary Fire Department, **Dave Evans** is the dive-master and rescuer. He will be on duty before Memorial Day if the weather merits. He advised that **all emergencies should be reported to 911**, and the dispatcher will find the right responder to call.

PARK OPERATIONS

Tiffany Merrills, Marquette Park manager, reported that 70 events are booked at the Pavilion, including all weekends for the remainder of the summer.

With additional income from the park's non-reverting fund, a new maintenance man has been hired and a new aquatic manager will supervise the life-guards. The use of plastic liners for the trash cans on the beach will be continued, and a 'Rhino' with a trailer will pick up the trash, in place of the front-loaders previously used. A contract has been signed for maintenance of the Lake Street boat launch. Bike lanes in the park will be repainted.

Numerous events have been planned at the park. **Taco Tuesdays**, the second and fourth Tuesday of each month, have already started. The Fuze caterers offer all-you-can-eat tacos for \$10 with drinks from a cash bar to wash them down. **Drive-in movies** have been scheduled on the last Friday of each month through September, starting at dusk. A **Mothers' Day brunch** on May 14 will offer an elaborate buffet, \$24 for adults or \$15 for children.

MISCELLANEOUS

No-parking signs at Locust and Shelby, along with additional late-night patrols, aim to reduce the number of after-hours revelers on the beach. The Locust/Shelby group is also advocating resident-only parking in some of the area.
